As a result of Stark County's participation in the Ohio Institute for Equity in Birth Outcomes (OEI), the Canton City Health Department brought together a comprehensive coalition of community partners to form Canton– Stark County THRIVE (Toward Health Resiliency in Infant Vitality and Equity) to address the infant mortality needs in Stark County to help all babies celebrate their first birthday.

Canton-Stark County THRIVE is a community collaborative working together to not only provide services to best ensure that our babies are born healthy, but to also connect those who most need the services to those resources and educate our community on infant mortality.

THRIVE Faith-based and Grassroots Initiative

Often, faith communities can reach women and men in ways the secular community and government agencies cannot. Faith communities can also provide the extra support that at-risk pregnant women need. On April 27, 2017, the Canton City Health Department, on behalf of Canton-Stark County THRIVE, released a Request for Proposals to faith-based and grassroots organizations for the implementation or expansion of programs resulting in measurable change to improve infant mortality and disparity rates. Organizations were eligible to apply for up to two years of funding. A panel of diverse individuals representative of Stark County served as our review team to make a final decision about which programs would receive the awards. Abide Ministries · Life Skills Program

New Baltimore Community Church \cdot Wards 1 & 2 in Alliance, Ohio Holly Holbrook-Swonger

The Life Skills program will be a series of twelve two-hour classes on topics including parenting and infant care, housekeeping, finances and budgeting, cooking and nutrition. Located at Feed My Sheep Church, Abide Ministries is centrally located to reach the areas of Alliance with the worst birth outcomes. The goal of the Life Skills Program is to equip mothers with a variety of essential life skills in an effort to break the cycle of poverty. Through education and mentorship, Abide Ministries will strengthen a set of skills that includes holding a job, managing a household, raising happy and healthy children, and becoming productive members of the community. Pregnant women and mothers will be encouraged to attend the classes through provided childcare for children up to age seven and incentives for attendance in the series.

Canton Calvary Mission · More Than Just Diapers Program

Canton and across Stark County Marie Senften-Deitz, Executive Director

The More Than Just Diapers program will provide outreach and education for pregnant women, families, and women of childbearing age. There are four components to the program that include: nutrition and grocery shopping on a budget through the *Cooking Up A Storm* classes taught by Ohio State University Extension,

prenatal through post-partum classes, the impact of drugs and alcohol on a developing infant through a partnership with the Aultman WOW van, and smoking cessation classes taught by Mercy Medical Center's Tobacco Cessation Specialists. They will also refer into the Baby & Me Tobacco Free program administered by the Stark County Health Department for additional incentives for staying smoke-free.

Hannah's House 119 · Parenting Mentoring Program

The Parenting Mentoring Program offers mentoring and group sessions for pregnant/young mothers aged 13-23 to provide emotional support, teach parenting skills based on the *Nurturing Parenting Program for Teenage Parents and their Children* curriculum, encourage prenatal care, and assist with appointment transportation. Their goal is that through this one-on-one support, young mothers will be able to break the cycle of poverty and raise healthy children. Referrals into the program come from in-school mentoring and the court system. There are currently 25 participants who are referred from in-school mentoring programs or the court system.

Mary Church Terrell Federated Club · Infant Mortality Awareness Campaign– Stay Woke

Mary Church Terrell Federated Club will develop a team of speakers that is diverse, relevant and authentic to the Canton community. The speakers will work with the THRIVE team to learn about efforts to prevent and reduce infant mortality and disparity rates. This speakers bureau will include multi-generational, culturally competent advocates and allies who belong to the community to which outreach is occurring. The strategy they have chosen will focus on preteen/teens, young adults, and middle age and seniors and each will have specific areas for education and intervention. Emphasis will be placed on building a community of caring and sharing within the team as well as helping to get women the help and connections needed.

James M. Adams, Health Commissioner, Canton City Health Department

James M. Adams was appointed Canton City Health Commissioner in 2008 after serving the city as Director of Environmental Health. Commissioner Adams is experienced in the development, implementation and management of various public health programs. He has broad knowledge in environmental health, public health, industrial hygiene, epidemiology and public health management. He is a Registered Sanitarian and prior to moving to the Canton area, he gained experience with Lorain County Board of Health in Elyria, Ohio and Ohio Department of Health in Akron, Ohio. Commissioner Adams oversees the operations of five divisions and

nearly 60 staff members within the Health Department. He also serves as Registrar for the Vital Statistics Division within the department The Ohio Environmental Health Association has awarded Commissioner Adams the Northeast District Outstanding Sanitarian Award (1992) and the President's Award (1996). He received a Certificate of Appreciation from the US Postal Service for service during the anthrax attacks of 2001. He supports the community as a Past President of the Perry Adult Cross Country Booster Club, a Community Representative for Stark County Head Start Policy and Governance Board, a member of Stark County Emergency Management Agency Advisory Committee, and Trustee for Stark County Family Council. Commissioner Adams holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Environmental Health from Cleveland State University and a Master of Public Health degree from the University of Michigan.
